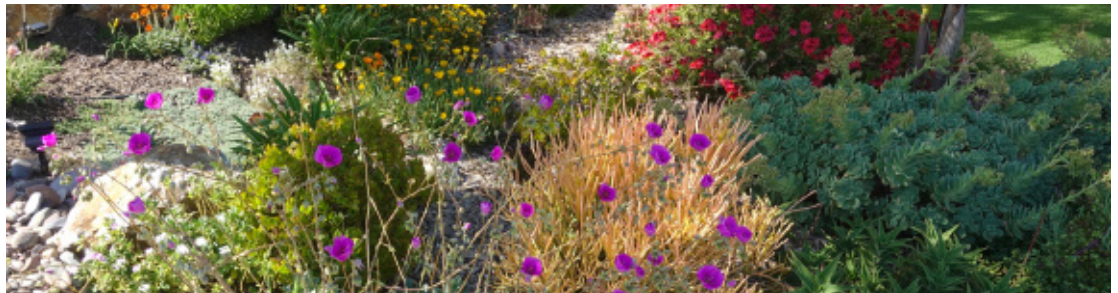

WATER-WISE LANDSCAPING IN PARK STRIPS



Property owners in Saratoga Springs can replace grassy areas in their parking strip with water-wise landscaping or xeriscaping. Xeriscaping means landscaping using drought-tolerant trees, grasses, shrubs, and hardscapes. The City encourages xeriscaping that is done properly and aesthetically, consistent with applicable City laws. Landscaping may also be subject to HOA rules or development plans, so, if applicable, check with them before you make any changes.

Park strips can contain the following water-wise options: turf, trees, shrubs, mulch, live plant vegetation below three feet in height, landscape rock, cobble, and removable pavers. (Saratoga Springs City Code 19.06.08(2)(a)(i)).

Generally, hardscaping features do not require any water making them a water-wise choice. However, at least thirty percent (30%) of each park strip must contain plantings. (19.06.08(2)(a)(ii)).

There are many beautiful water-wise

plants and hardscaping features, but some plants and hardscaping features are not allowed in park strips. Park strips are not allowed to contain weeds, dead vegetation, fruit trees, fruit and vegetable gardens, gravel, asphalt, concrete, or large boulders. (19.06.08(2)(a)(iii)). The City also discourages Hackberry and Honey Locust trees in park strips. (19.06.08(2)(a)(iv)). Please note that the property owner abutting a parking strip is required to maintain it. (19.06.08(2)).

The City's regulations allow for many appealing configurations of water-efficient landscaping in parking strips. For ideas for your parking strip, you can consult with a landscaping expert or do your own research.

AERIAL FIREWORK RESTRICTIONS!!
For the City of Saratoga Springs



7 June 2023

Dear Constituents,

As your Fire Chief, Effective Immediately! I am implementing an Aerial Fireworks Restriction on both sides of the following streets in the City of Saratoga Springs. This is due to extreme fire conditions on the 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th of July 2023; and the 22nd, 23rd, 24th and 25th of July 2023.

- Due to rapid construction, if your street is not shown on the current map, your street is therefore a restricted street to aerial fireworks. This map is as accurate visually as possible. However, please refer to the street list."
- Should you be found to be in violation of this fireworks ban, fines will begin at \$250.
- Also, should you be found to be responsible for the starting of a fire, any and all costs of that suppression effort will be borne by the responsible party.

If an individual(s) use of any fireworks in any setting causes a fire to break out; you can and will be held liable for any damages and costs associated with suppression of that fire(s).

If you live within 75 feet of an undeveloped lot or property in a residential neighborhood or area, ALL fireworks are banned from use in these areas within a 75-foot proximity of such property.

If you live within 200 feet of ANY undeveloped and urban interface area; this is any area that is next to the foothills, large areas of undeveloped property, or agriculture fields. ALL fireworks are banned from use in these areas within a 200-foot proximity of such property.

Always have a fire extinguisher and buckets of water available and make sure your smoke detectors are operating properly!!

Obeying Traffic Signals

Summer is here and many Saratoga Springs residents are taking advantage of the great weather. As a result, we are seeing an increase in traffic because our citizens want to enjoy the many outdoor recreational options available in our area. We want to remind everyone to drive safe and remember to obey our traffic laws. We have noticed an increase in drivers failing to abide by traffic control devices. Particularly, driving through an intersection after a red light signal is displayed or driving at unsafe speeds when a yellow signal is displayed.

Utah law makes it clear that a driver facing a steady red signal may not enter an intersection (Utah Code Ann. 41-6a-305). The driver is required to make a complete stop at a clearly marked stop line. If

there is no marked stop line the driver is required to stop before the marked or unmarked crosswalk. The driver may only proceed through the intersection after a green signal is given and after yielding to pedestrians and other vehicles lawfully in the intersection at the time the green signal is given. The law allows a driver making a right-hand turn to cautiously enter an intersection with a red light but only after making a complete stop and yielding to pedestrians in the crosswalk.

Also, a yellow light means that the allowable movement through an intersection related to a green light is being terminated. A yellow light is not a cue to drivers to speed up in order to make it through the intersection. A driver is

always under the obligation to travel at no greater speeds than those which are safe under the circumstances or those which are posted on speed limit signs. Therefore, if an accident occurs because a driver is unsafely attempting to make it through a yellow light, that driver may be cited and may be deemed at fault in a lawsuit or claim.

Sadly, over the past several years, our city has experienced many accidents and even deaths relating to drivers running red lights and driving at unsafe speeds through a yellow light. We urge all drivers to abide by Utah's traffic laws so everyone can feel safe on our roads and enjoy the many benefits of our great city.

Staging Landscaping Materials

As our City continues to grow, many residents are working to construct and complete their yards. When landscaping your property, please remember that City Ordinance requires materials to be staged on your property, and NOT in the street or roadway. Materials can be stored in

your driveway or yard. Barring unusual circumstances, materials may be staged in the parkstrip in the short term as well (please consult with Public Works prior for review and approval for parkstrip staging). Care should be taken not to block sidewalks or cover water meters (both culinary and secondary).

Improperly staged materials can create flooding scenarios, contaminate, and/or damage to our storm drain system. It can also impede emergency vehicles from gaining access into and out of our neighborhoods. Placing your material in the roadway may also result in code enforcement violation and fine.

When you receive your materials, make plans to use them as quickly as possible so that they do not wash down your driveway and in the storm drain system. If you have hired a contractor to do your landscaping for you, please remind them of these requirements and the reasons for them. Thanks to all of our residents for your help and assistance in keeping our storm drain system and the waters that receive its discharge clean and pollutant-free.
