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Saratoga Springs Hazard Mitigation Plan

The City of Saratoga Springs is updating the 2017 Hazard Mitigation Plan. This plan is designed to reduce the risks posed by hazards that affect our community and must be updated and approved by FEMA every five years to keep it current and to maintain eligibility for certain types of disaster assistance.

What is hazard mitigation?

The term “Hazard Mitigation” describes actions that can help reduce or eliminate long-term risks caused by hazards, such as wildfires, drought, floods, and severe storms. Hazard mitigation is best accomplished when based on a comprehensive, long-term plan developed before a disaster strikes.

As the costs of disaster impacts continue to rise, our community must find ways to reduce hazard risks. Oftentimes after disasters, repairs and reconstruction efforts are completed in such a way as to simply restore damaged property to pre-disaster conditions. These efforts may “get things back to normal,” but the replication of pre-disaster conditions often results in a repetitive cycle of damage, reconstruction, and repeated damage.

Hazard mitigation breaks this repetitive cycle by producing less vulnerable conditions through pre- and postdisaster repairs and reconstruction. The implementation of such hazard mitigation actions now, by state and local governments, means

building stronger, safer, and smarter communities that will be able to reduce future injuries and damages.

Project Benefits

Mitigation is an investment in a community's future safety and sustainability. Recent cost-


benefit studies have proven mitigation to be cost effective for communities, with mitigation projects returning \$6 for every \$1 spent. Mitigation planning helps communities take action now, before a disaster, to reduce impacts when a disaster occurs.



How to Get Involved:

Residents, organizations, and businesses are encouraged to contribute to the planning process. Over the next few months, the planning team will be reaching out to the public to provide input on hazards and their mitigation. The updated plan is anticipated to be ready for public review this winter with multiple opportunities for community involvement. 

Firework Safety

CITY OF SARATOGA SPRINGS

SARATOGA SPRINGS FIRE & RESCUE

July 2 - July 5,
11am - 11pm, July
4 till Midnight

- If an individual(s) use of any fireworks in any setting causes a fire to break out; you can and will be held liable for any damages and costs associated with suppression of that fire(s).
- If you live within 75 feet of an undeveloped lot or property in a residential neighborhood or area, ALL fireworks are banned from use in these areas within a 75-foot proximity of such property.
- If you live within 200 feet of ANY undeveloped and urban interface area; this is any area that is next to the foothills, large areas of undeveloped property, or agriculture fields.
 - ALL fireworks are banned from use in these areas within a 200-foot proximity of such property.
- Have a fire extinguisher and buckets of water available and make sure your smoke detectors are operating properly.



Fueling a Change in How We Protect Our Waters

Can a river catch on fire? YES, it sure can, if there's enough pollution in it.

That's what happened to the Ohio Cuyahoga River in 1969. At that time, several steel mills, manufacturing plants, and a paint company were dumping their old products into the river, and the water

became saturated with chemicals. These chemicals made the river murky, slick, and extremely toxic. Consequently, it was little surprise that the river went up in flames several times in just a few years.

Since then, the United States has become more environmentally aware and continues to make efforts to protect our bodies of water. However, we can't do that without you!

One of the best ways to protect our water from pollution is to properly clean up spilled or discarded fuel. If you happen to spill fuel, please pour kitty litter or sand

onto the spill. Then sweep it up. You can dispose of the contaminated soil at your local waste station. The same is true when getting rid of old chemicals like oil, gasoline, hydraulic fluid, paint, or chlorine. These items should not be thrown out in your regular trash; they must be discarded properly at one of many chemical disposal sites available. For more information, contact the Utah County Health Department.

Communication



Accurate information allows you to make informed decisions. Communication is often the first thing lost in an emergency. Reliable and true information sources are essential during a disaster. Not all sources will be available depending on the emergency.

Knowing and having multiple ways of giving and receiving information will help you “Be Ready” to communicate and be reunited with

family and friends.


- Establish an out-of-state contact for family members to call and report status and location in the event of an emergency.
- Establish an outside-the-home emergency meeting place.
- Establish an outside-the-neighborhood emergency meeting place.
- Gather and maintain emergency communications supplies.
- Learn the emergency communications plans for your city, schools, and places of employment.
- Learn various kinds of emergency signaling.
